GUIDE FOR PARENTS:

"How to Register Your Son for Camp Barstow"

STEP 1. Check with your son's Scoutmaster to determine what week his troop is planning to attend. The fee is \$80.00 per Scout if your son pays \$30.00 by April 29, 1988, (this qualifies him to receive the "Early Bird" segment) and the balance of \$50.00 by June 12, 1988. The \$30.00 is transferrable, but not refundable. After May 1, the fee is \$90.00. Scouts attending camp with their Scout troops should register with and pay all fees to their Scoutmaster.

PROVISIONAL PLAN: If your son's troop has not planned to attend camp, or he wishes to attend a 2nd or 3rd week, you may choose to use the "provisional plan." This simply means that the camp provides the troop leadership. The provisional troop program is available each of the regular weeks of camp. All provisional campers make reservations and pay fees to the Council Service Center. Add \$5.00 to

the fee for using the provisional plan.

STEP 2. Help your son develop a savings plan so he may pay his \$30.00 by April 29, 1988 and receive the "Early

Bird" patch segment.

STEP 3. Your son's troop will have a special Parent/Camp/ Information Night sometime in early spring. At this important meeting you will receive the latest information on his troop's program plan, transportation, baggage, etc.

TRANSPORTATION: Scout troops and provisional Scout campers will arrange their own transportation to Camp Barstow. Check-in is Sunday afternoon from 2:00-4:00.

Check-out is Saturday morning from 9:00-11:00.

PHYSICAL EXAM & HEALTH SERVICES: Each Scout is required to have a medical exam by a licensed physician prior to attending camp. However, you need only review the form, health history, and sign if he has had a physical exam within the last three years. Forms are available from your Scoutmaster or Council Service Center. During camp the Health Lodge will be staffed by a qualified health officer. Should any emergency arise, it will be handled at Lexington Medical Center. The camp fee provides accident and sickness insurance for all Scout campers.

THE CAMP STAFF ...

You can feel secure in the staff helping your Scoutmaster to provide a good summer camp program for your son and other Scouts from your troop while at camp. The Camp Director, Camp Ranger, Program Director, Field Sports Director, Aquatic Director and Camp Commissioners are trained and certified by the National Camp School of the Boy Scouts of America. In addition, many staff have American Red Cross C.P.R. training.

THE CAMP...

Camp Barstow is a 962 acre camping reservation located 16 miles from Columbia, off Highway 323 South, near Gaston, S. C. Camp Barstow is owned and operated by the Indian Waters Council for all youth meeting Scouting membership requirements.
